Eero Saarinen: Shaping the Future

Assa Abloy has invited AIA Connecticut to a special reception and tours of the *Eero Saarinen: Shaping the Future* exhibition at the Yale University School of Architecture and the Yale University Art Gallery on March 11, 2010. Please join us!

One of the most prolific, unorthodox and controversial masters of 20th century architecture, Eero Saarinen helped to create an international image for the United States with his designs. Saarinen's work demonstrates how architects have the power to connect people when envisioning building design.

5 to 6:15 pm *Exhibition and Reception, tours with Dean Sakamoto, FAIA, Exhibition Director, School of Architecture, and John Stuart Gordon, Benjamin Attmore Hewitt Assistant Curator, American Decorative Arts, Yale Art Gallery.*

6:15 to 7:15 pm *Remarks by Harold Roth, FAIA, and Phil Kinsella, AIA, who both worked with Saarinen in Michigan. Roth and Kinsella will reflect on their experience and describe how a number of his twentieth-century landmarks were successfully accomplished. Both moved with the office to Connecticut following Saarinen's premature death in 1961. Roth is a partner of Roth and Moore Architects in New Haven; Kinsella is a partner of Kevin Roche John Dinkeloo Associates in Hamden, successor to Eero Saarinen and Associates.*

The exhibition is located at the Architecture School and at the Yale University Art Gallery, located directly across from the Architecture School (Entrance on Chapel Street). Tours will be conducted at both the Art Gallery and the Architecture School. We will meet at the Architecture School.

Directions to Architecture School: From I-95 North or South, take exit 47, Downtown New Haven. Stay on the connector to the third and final exit. At the first light, turn right on York Street. After crossing Crown Street, look for a brick faced public parking garage on your left, mid-block, at 150 York Street. Exit the parking garage and turn to the left. Paul Rudolph Hall, formerly the Yale Art and Architecture Building, is across Chapel Street. Entrance is on York Street. There are also metered spaces on nearby streets. **From I-91**, take Exit 1, Downtown New Haven and follow as above.
